The American Board of Family Practice is pleased to announce the employment of Dr. Robert Avant as Deputy Executive Director. Dr. Avant has been active in family practice for many years. 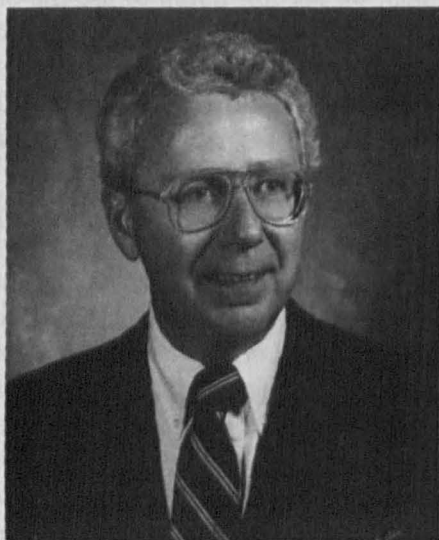
family practice, as well as specialty certification. Robert is married and has three sons.

Unsanctioned Certifying Boards

At the time of this writing, several Diplomates have received communication from the American Board of Sports Medicine, Inc., in Atlanta, Georgia. Evidently, this organization is planning to develop and implement an examination that presumably would lead to a certificate of some kind. The ABFP has no knowledge of this organization or of its leadership. There is apparently a fairly ambitious plan for test development.

This kind of activity is not new in American medicine. There are more than 100 self-designated certifying bodies for physicians in the USA. There are only 23 certifying boards that have been evaluated by the American Medical Association (AMA) and the American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS) and subsequently have been made member boards of the ABMS. The American Board of Family Practice is a member board of the ABMS, having achieved that status by a rigorous evaluation by both the AMA and the ABMS. The American Board of Sports Medicine, Inc., has not undergone this degree of scrutiny. The qualifications of the people and the processes of certification have not been determined by an external evaluation.

We would advise that you consider carefully the decision to invest in the certifying process. Base your decision on reasonable criteria and ask: (1) Who is establishing the standard? (2) Is the examination reliable and valid? (3) Is the certificate acceptable generally as a measure of specialty credentials?
